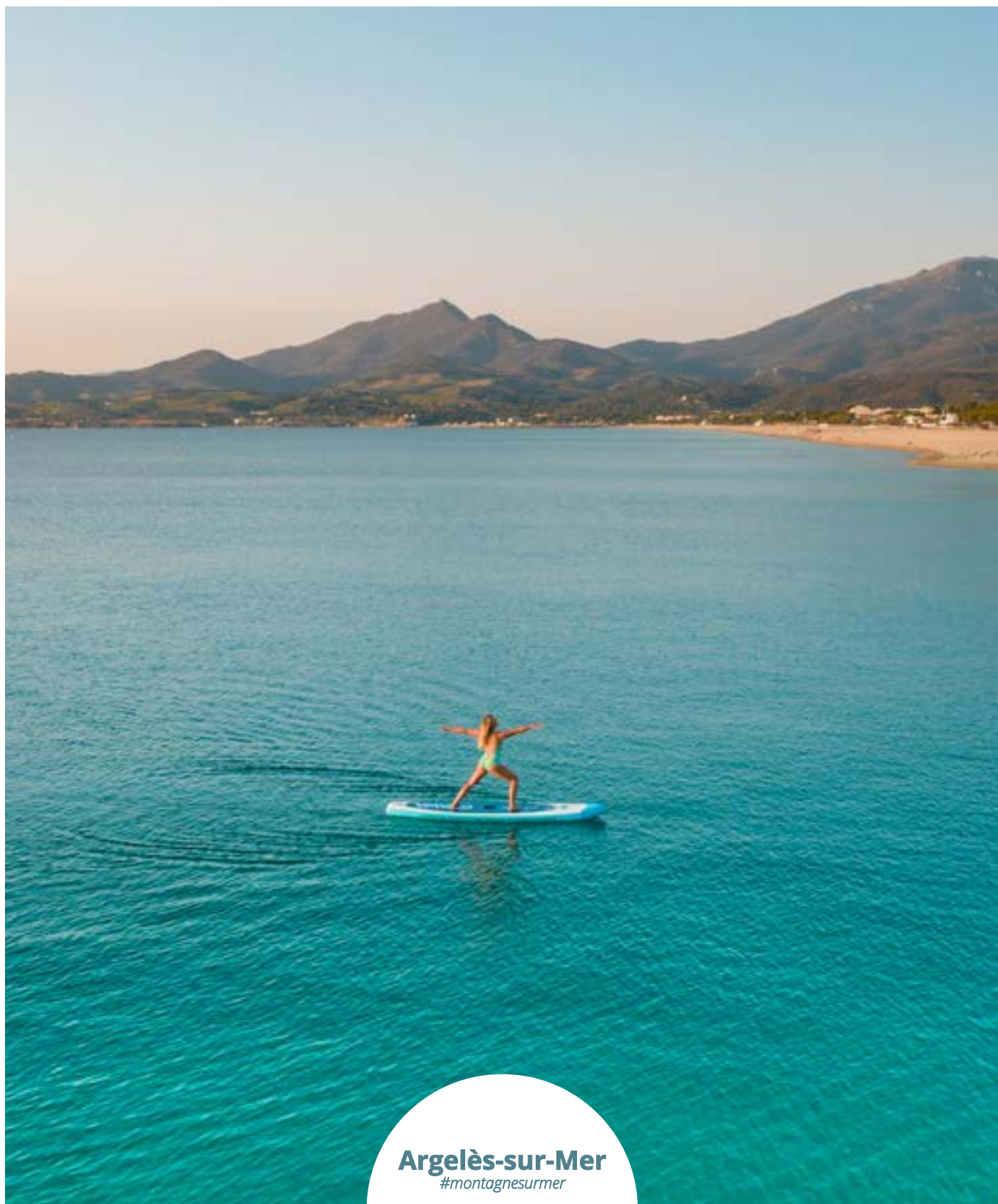

Argelès-sur-Mer is one of the most prominent tourist resorts in the south of France.

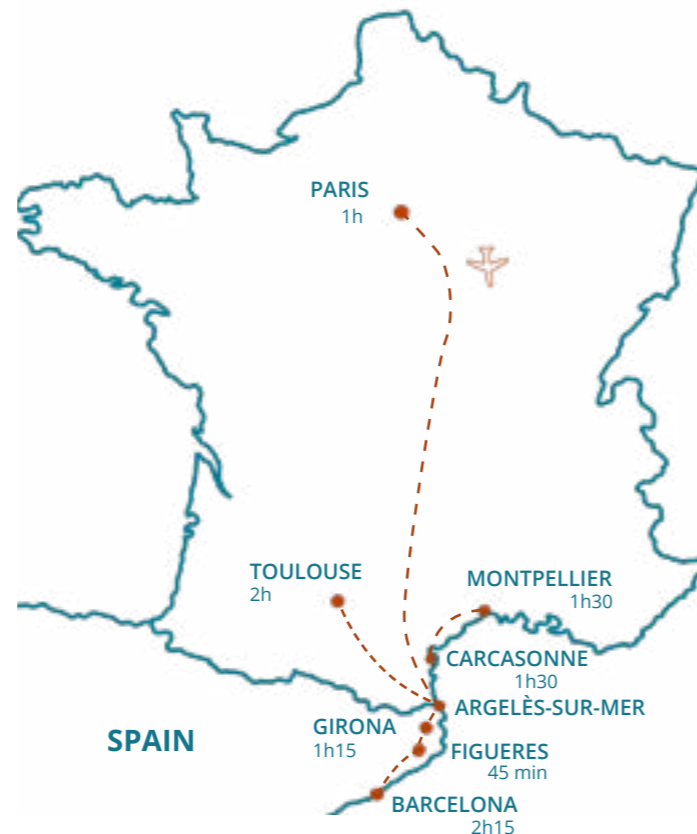
A leading destination on the Catalan coast, Argelès-sur-Mer enjoys an exceptional location between sea and mountains, where rocky shores meet sandy beaches, bordered by the Mediterranean Sea and the Pyrenees. Its name comes from the clay-rich soil on which the town was built.

This former 9th-century city stretches nearly 10km along the Mediterranean coast and is now renowned for its sea breeze spots and peaceful atmosphere. .

A Distinct Tourist Identity

With an average stay of 9.5 nights, Argelès-sur-Mer ranks as the leading tourist resort in the Pyrénées-Orientales department and the second-largest in the Occitanie region.

It is also known as the European capital of open-air hospitality.

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A JOURNEY Through Time

1860-1865

The first pine trees were planted along the Argelès coastline to dry out the wetlands and give new life to the seafont.



1866

A handful of elegant seaside villas appeared.



1872

The town council authorized wooden bathing cabins for summer visitors. Soon, a lively little beach village sprang up each season.



1889

An "apolitical pamphlet" suggested ideas for developing Argelès-sur-Mer and, for the very first time, mentioned the creation of a harbor.

1896

The first beachfront restaurant opened: **La Réserve.**



1901

Soldiers from the "Marsouins" garrison pitched their tents among the pines unwitting pioneers of the camping spirit that still defines Argelès today.



1904

The Local Initiative and Interest Committee for Argelès Beach was founded the ancestor of today's Tourist Office.

1913

Mr. Pompidor launched a motor shuttle between the train station and the beach, making the coastline more accessible than ever.



1922

A request was made to install a removable wooden cabin on Racou Beach, a small step toward the modern beach experience.



1932

Pierre Izard published the first tourist brochure: "Argelès-sur-Mer, a Climatic and Seaside Resort." The village's charm was now shared far and wide.

1939

Following the Spanish Civil War, thousands of Spanish Republicans fled across the border. The Argelès-sur-Mer camp was created, a poignant chapter in local memory.



1950

Creation of the "pilot camp", the first area devoted entirely to camping, a prelude to the many campsites that would follow.



1954

A local farmer opened Camping Bouix, charging campers for the first time. The camping tradition took root.



1961

The first two lifeguard stations were set up on the beach to protect swimmers under the Mediterranean sun.



1963

Argelès welcomed 100,000 summer visitors.

1986

Tourist activities became professionalized with the creation of the Municipal Events Office, ensuring lively summers for all.



1972

The commune created a Municipal Tourist Office to provide information and welcome visitors in a more contemporary way.



1993

The Tourist Office opened new beachfront premises.



1974

The seaside promenade began to take shape, an elegant walkway that today invites you to stroll between sky and sea.



2019

Showers on the beach were removed to save water and reduce waste, a commitment to sustainable tourism.



1986

A ministerial decree authorized the construction of the Argelès harbor. Soon, boats would find their home by the Catalan coast.

HISTORY AND THE RISE of Tourism

Rich in history, blessed with golden beaches and diverse landscapes, Argelès-sur-Mer has become a much-loved tourist destination that continues to evolve, offering visitors unique and memorable experiences



Pitching a Tent In Argelès-sur-mer

Today, Argelès-sur-Mer is famous for its sunny beaches and vibrant summer atmosphere but it all began with just a few tents under the pine trees! Long before modern campsites, the first holidaymakers came here to stake their tents in the sand, marking the beginning of a true tourism phenomenon.

From Pine Woods (Bois des PINS) To the First Wild Campsite

In the early 1900s, locals were the first to enjoy the idyllic setting of the Bois des Pins, pitching their tents beneath the whispering pines. Word spread quickly, this little corner of paradise soon became the place to be. By 1935, the town decided to bring a bit of order to this joyful chaos, appointing a deputy ranger to keep an eye on the campers and... collect the famous camping fee!



Bathing For Every Social Class!

In the 19th century, Argelès-sur-Mer charmed the bourgeoisie with its fashionable sea bathing, popularized by Empress Eugénie herself. The arrival of the railway in 1865 made the town more accessible, even though the beach was still used for grazing animals. Then came the 1930s, a true revolution! Paid holidays made seaside leisure accessible to everyone, sunbathing became the new craze, and swimsuits shrank... all the way down to the bikini!

Finally, Holidays for Everyone!

The famous paid holidays of 1936 changed everything. A revolution for French workers and for Argelès-sur-Mer! Dreaming of sunshine and sea air, many families packed their bags (or rather, their tents) and headed south. Camping became the symbol of affordable holidays, beaches filled with laughter, and the first official campsites appeared. People pitched their tents, breathed in the salty breeze, and enjoyed la belle vie!

From Local Committee to Tourist Office

In 1904, the Local Initiative Committee of Argelès-sur-Mer was founded to attract visitors. By 1972, it reinvented itself as the Municipal Tourist Office, ready to welcome an ever-growing number of holidaymakers. Then, in 1986, the Municipal Events Office was created to bring even more fun with concerts, shows, and events lighting up the town all year long!

No Concrete Plans, Just Big Dreams!

During the 1960s and 70s, while the Plan Racine transformed much of the coast with concrete resorts, Argelès-sur-Mer not included in the project chose another path. Here, tourism remained natural, friendly, and open to everyone.



Argelès-sur-Mer Takes the Lead!

As the beloved Bois des Pins became too small for the growing number of visitors, a new solution emerged the creation of a "Pilot Camp", a prototype of modern camping spread over 10 hectares. In 1955, the site was entrusted to the municipality and renamed Le Roussillonnais. This pioneering campsite still exists today now known as the Municipal Camping Ground of Argelès-sur-Mer!

Architectural Treasures

The remarkable villas of Argelès-sur-Mer, built by wealthy families from Perpignan, blend classical styles and artistic flair. By 1866, around ten villas already adorned the seafront. Among them, Le Chalet, designed by Viggo Dorph-Petersen (the architect of the Château de Valmy), still stands proudly along the promenade, with its ornate ironwork and balconies. Others, such as Villa Oasis or Lucien Pêche's residence, have withstood the test of time though some have sadly vanished. Yet many architectural gems can still be admired today!



A Fruitful Idea

The story of the first private campsite began with Mr. Bouix, a visionary farmer. In 1953, a few adventurous campers decided to set up their tents in his orchard! Instead of turning them away, Mr. Bouix had a brilliant idea: he transformed his field into a campsite. And so, Camping Bouix, the very first private campsite in the commune, was born an orchard turned into a camping ground. A truly fruitful idea

Visitors in search of a little more adventure can explore the wild coves along the rocky coastline, perfect for discovery, snorkeling, or more intimate moments facing the Mediterranean.



Le Racou

A PLACE LIKE NO OTHER

There's a unique atmosphere at Le Racou meaning "the corner" in Catalan a feeling of being at the very edge of Argelès-sur-Mer's little world. What makes this place so special are its sand-covered cottages, separated by narrow, flower-lined lanes that give it a timeless charm. It's right here, at this exact spot in Le Racou, that the Pyrenees meet the Mediterranean Sea.



The Coastal Path

A CHARMING SEASIDE WALK

Argelès-sur-Mer invites visitors to discover the Coastal Path, a remarkable 32 km trail linking the mouth of the River Tech to the Spanish border.

The walk begins at the river's mouth and winds through the Mas Larrieu Nature Reserve, a protected area managed by the Conservatoire du Littoral since 1984. Guided walks reveal a mosaic of meadows, dunes, reed beds, and alluvial forests, teeming with biodiversity that must be carefully preserved.

Following the coastline, walkers are enchanted by oleanders, tamarisks, pine trees, and palms that line the lush promenade of the central beach in Argelès-sur-Mer. The path then leads to the Port, before reaching Le Racou, a picturesque district where charming cottages are built directly on the sand.

The Port

SET SAIL FOR NEW HORIZONS

Café terraces, lively markets, the tempting aroma of fresh fish from seaside restaurants, and a wide range of water activities it's no wonder so many visitors set course for the Port of Argelès-sur-Mer. Whether with family, friends, or hand in hand with a loved one, let yourself be carried away by the vibrant, relaxed atmosphere of Port-Argelès!

FISHING

In soup, in sauce, or simply grilled to perfection the fresh fish caught by Argelès' fishermen are the stars of local cuisine. There's every reason to get caught in the net! Every morning, all year round, local fishermen sell their catch of the day directly from their boats at the Quai du Môle.



The Marine Park

ENDEMIC SPECIES OF THE MEDITERRANEAN

Within the protected waters of the Gulf of Lion Marine Natural Park, which borders the Argelès coastline, rich ecosystems, exceptional maritime heritage, and diverse activities coexist in harmony.

Covering an area of 4,010 km² almost the size of the Pyrénées-Orientales department the park is home to over 1,200 animal species and around 500 plant species.

Among these, 49 species are protected under national, European, or international regulations. Notable examples include Posidonia seagrass, red coral, the noble pen shell and date mussel (bivalves), the great Mediterranean slipper lobster (crustacean), the white skate, and the bottlenose dolphin.

A dedicated team of nearly 20 staff members plays a vital role in sustainable management supporting research, conservation, and raising public awareness about the rich biodiversity of the Mediterranean Sea.





Water Sports

The town stands out for its wide range of clubs and specialized schools, with around ten centers spread along the coast.

These establishments offer lessons and equipment rentals for a variety of activities including sailing, paddleboarding, kitesurfing, wingfoiling, windsurfing, and kayaking. Whether you're a beginner or an expert, everyone will find an activity suited to their level and style. In addition to its modern, well-maintained facilities, Argelès-sur-Mer enjoys an ideal climate and steady winds, much to the delight of water sports lovers. The Tramontane, the region's iconic wind, blows regularly, offering perfect conditions for sailing and kitesurfing all year round.

Board Sports

The Mas Larrieu Nature Reserve

AMONG THE « IMMORTELLES »

Before heading higher into the Pyrenean foothills, make your way to the Mas Larrieu Nature Reserve, located at the mouth of the Tech River. Spanning 160 hectares of unspoilt landscapes, it offers a remarkable mosaic of preserved natural environments.

Designated as a protected site since 1984, this remarkable area is home to a rich diversity of landscapes, alternating between meadows, dunes, reed beds and alluvial forests. From the riverbanks, the view stretches as far as the majestic Canigou peak, while the air is filled with the spicy scents of everlasting flowers, whose delicate fragrance is especially noticeable at the first light of day.

Blooming in spring, they herald the arrival of the summer season. A true sentinel of biodiversity along the Argelès coastline, the reserve lies at the meeting point of freshwater and saltwater, creating a unique ecosystem that fosters the flourishing of exceptional flora and fauna.

This area is one of the last remaining wild natural sites along the Roussillon coastline, playing an essential role as a refuge for numerous species, some of which are rare or endangered. Despite its relatively small size, the Mas Larrieu Nature Reserve stands out for its great diversity of landscapes, illustrating the fragile and precious balance between the different coastal habitats.

A must-see destination for nature lovers and environmental enthusiasts, it bears witness to the ecological richness of the territory.



The Massane Beech Forest

A NATURAL AND SCIENTIFIC SANCTUARY

Listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2024, the Massane National Nature Reserve is a beech forest that has been left to evolve freely for more than 150 years. Located at the easternmost edge of the Albères Mountains, it spans 300 hectares and is home to over 12,000 recorded species.

A true open-air scientific laboratory, the reserve has served as a zoological research site for more than five decades, contributing to the study of biodiversity and climate change. In the face of environmental challenges, its dedicated team works tirelessly to protect this natural treasure and to raise awareness about its vital importance for the future of our planet.



The Albères Mountain Range

A LAND OF LIFE AND PASSAGE

The Albères range, a proud mountain barrier overlooking the beaches of Argelès-sur-Mer, stretches across the entire southern half of the region. This massif, crossed by deep valleys and framed by peaks rising over 1,000 meters, forms the final foothills of the Pyrenees before they plunge into the sea.

Alongside olive trees, two main species thrive in the wooded areas: holm oak and cork oak. Higher up, these give way to forests of ash, birch, hazel, and chestnut trees, painting a lush and varied landscape through the seasons.

From the Château de Valmy to the Tour de la Massane, hikers and mountain bikers can explore well-marked trails and enjoy breathtaking panoramic views of both the sea and the mountains. Further inland, Mount Canigou, towering over the Roussillon plain, stands as a true landmark for locals sometimes clear, sometimes snow-capped, and often veiled in mist. For cyclists across Catalonia, it remains a symbolic summit and the ultimate challenge.

The Massane Tower

A HIKER'S FAVOURITE

Standing 800 metres above sea level, the Massane Tower watches over the Roussillon plain and the Mediterranean, inviting visitors to explore the heart of the Albères Mountains. Accessible only on foot, this 13th-century watchtower, which still overlooks Argelès-sur-Mer today, is a must-see for lovers of heritage and wide-open spaces.

Starting from Valmy Castle, the route forms a 12.6-km loop with an elevation gain of 890 metres, taking around five hours to complete. Along the way, the trail reveals a remarkable heritage: dolmens, dry-stone shelters, and other traces of a centuries-old past.

An immersive experience blending nature and history, this hike is sure to enchant both heritage enthusiasts and panoramic-trail lovers alike.



Mountain biking outing

A GENTLE TWO-WHEELED EXPLORATION

Exploring the Albères Massif by mountain bike offers a unique immersion in a variety of landscapes, with the Mediterranean Sea as a stunning backdrop. This experience combines pleasure and accessibility, allowing riders to fully enjoy breathtaking views without requiring intense physical effort.

The adventure begins in the heart of the resort, near the beach, with an introduction to the full-suspension e-bikes powerful and perfectly suited for all levels. Thanks to this high-performance equipment, everyone can ride at their own pace, regardless of fitness level.

As the route unfolds, cyclists discover a mosaic of scenery: sandy trails, shaded paths beneath the pines, the picturesque lanes of the village, and the Mediterranean gardens along the way. The ride leads up to the Château de Valmy, a starting point for many cycling and hiking routes at the very heart of the Albères massif.



The Valmy Castle Park

A BUCOLIC AND ROMANTIC SETTING

Overlooking Argelès-sur-Mer, the Valmy Park offers one of the most beautiful panoramic views of the town and the surrounding landscapes of the Pyrénées-Orientales, where mountain ridges blend harmoniously with the shores of the Mediterranean Sea.

A true 6-hectare haven of greenery, this site open freely to the public invites visitors to relax, wander, and discover. Built between the 19th and early 20th centuries, the park once belonged to the Pams and Bardou families, who transformed this wine estate into a place of elegance and distinction. Fountains, sculptures, ponds, and a crypt still bear witness to that prestigious era.

In the background stands the majestic Château de Valmy, a private residence with a Roaring Twenties charm, giving the park a refined and timeless atmosphere. Today, a botanical and cultural trail featuring around 15 themed panels allows visitors to explore the site's history, heritage, and biodiversity. Blending nature, culture, and heritage, the Valmy Park stands as one of the emblematic landmarks of Argelès-sur-Mer a place made for leisurely strolls, reflection, and discovery.



Saint-Laurent-du-Mont Chapel

WHERE CULTURE MEETS NATURE

Perched high above Argelès-sur-Mer, the Saint-Laurent-du-Mont Chapel offers a breathtaking panorama over the Mediterranean Sea and its surroundings. Dedicated to Saint Lawrence, the patron saint of sailors, it remains a cherished pilgrimage site for both locals and visitors.

Built in the 12th century in a pure Romanesque style, the chapel is one of the architectural gems of the Argelès hills. Its simple, harmonious layout entirely crafted from cut stone reflects centuries-old craftsmanship. Once serving as the parish church for the many farmsteads scattered across the slopes, it bears witness to the region's spiritual and rural heritage.

Today, this remarkable site, managed by the Ermitages d'Argelès Association, is an ideal stop for those seeking to combine cultural discovery with a peaceful immersion in nature.



Notre-Dame de Vie

A PEACEFUL SETTING

Perched at an altitude of 134 metres, the Notre-Dame de Vie Chapel overlooks Argelès-sur-Mer, offering an exceptional panoramic view of the Mediterranean Sea and the surrounding hills. A true haven of peace, this historic site dedicated to the Virgin Mary has long been an important pilgrimage destination, particularly during Easter and Pentecost celebrations.

Its picturesque architecture and serene atmosphere make it a special place for reflection and contemplation. Listed on the Supplementary Inventory of Historic Monuments since 1944, this centuries-old chapel enchants visitors with both its spiritual heritage and the sense of tranquility that pervades it. An unmissable visit for anyone wishing to combine spirituality, culture, and nature in a single moment of harmony.

A Touch of History

WHERE IT ALL BEGAN

Argelès-sur-Mer takes its name from the clay-rich soil on which it was built a legacy reflected in its Latin etymology, Argilla, meaning clay.

To truly understand the identity of Argelès-sur-Mer, one must dive into its past. Over the centuries, this town has witnessed a tumultuous history, successively ruled by the Kings of Aragon, Majorca, and Spain, before becoming definitively French in 1659 with the signing of the Treaty of the Pyrenees.

Today, this rich heritage lives on in every corner of the town in its Mediterranean-inspired architecture, its authentic gastronomy celebrating Catalan flavours, and its language, proudly passed down through generations. To stroll through its narrow streets is to feel the soul of Argelès-sur-Mer where tradition and modern charm coexist in perfect harmony.

Local Specialties

A CULINARY HERITAGE

In Argelès-sur-Mer, gastronomy is a true tribute to its Catalan roots, blending Mediterranean flavours, generous portions, and comforting dishes that bring people together.

Among the must-try dishes is the cargolade, an emblematic meal of grilled snails, typically enjoyed outdoors under the Mediterranean sun. This Catalan specialty is a culinary rite of passage for anyone wishing to discover the authentic taste of Argelès-sur-Mer.

When temperatures drop, locals turn to heartier fare such as l'ouillade ("ollada" in Catalan) a flavourful Catalan stew made with pork, barley, and slow-cooked cabbage, offering a delicious burst of warmth and comfort.

Fans of traditional cuisine will also delight in boles de picolat tender meatballs simmered in a rich, aromatic sauce, perfect for satisfying even the heartiest appetites.



Notre-Dame del Prat Church

A CHURCH THAT STANDS OUT

This 14th-century religious building, designed in the Southern Gothic style, is the parish church of the town. Inside, visitors can admire nine masterpieces of Roussillon Renaissance painting, depicting various episodes from the lives of Christ and the Virgin Mary.

Rising to a height of 34 metres, the bell tower overlooks Place Saint-Côme-et-Saint-Damien, named after the patron saints of Argelès. Although never fully completed, it remains one of the tallest bell towers in the Roussillon region.

A Village in Catalan Colours

IT'S IN THE AIR

The Catalan spirit reveals itself in every corner of the land. The brick façades of the town's iconic red clay bricks and the terracotta cornices in vibrant shades reflect the distinctive character of Argelès-sur-Mer.

Wandering through its picturesque lanes, visitors discover a world of color and fragrance, where brightly painted façades mingle with the captivating aromas of local markets. Here, Catalan identity shines proudly carried by the musical accent of the locals and the warm, welcoming atmosphere that invites you to slow down, explore, and feel at home.

In the historic heart of Argelès-sur-Mer, a maze of lively alleys unfolds, where local shops and gourmet addresses celebrate the flavours and traditions of the South.

From the forecourt of the Notre-Dame del Prat Church to the village's small boutiques, every step offers an authentic glimpse of Catalan life, under the watchful eye of the Massane Tower, standing guard over the town.



MEETING THE *Producers*



DOMAINE SAINT THOMAS

For Pierre-Jean Savoldelli, it all began with a clear vision: to create a place of conviviality and reconnection with the land, where he could share his deep passion for wine, flavour, and the simple joys of life. This simplicity, however, comes with discipline and constant care reflected in the estate's conversion to organic farming in 2020.

Located in Argelès-sur-Mer, the Domaine Saint Thomas produces a wide range of wines reds, whites, rosés, sparkling wines, and naturally sweet wines under the prestigious appellations AOP Collioure, AOP Banyuls, AOP Côtes du Roussillon, and IGP Côtes Catalanes. The Domaine embodies a commitment to change and ethical values, dedicated not only to the quality of its wines and the preservation of Roussillon's terroirs, but also to the well-being of its winemakers and customers alike.

DOMAINE DU MAS CRISTINE

With its ideal location overlooking the sea, nestled among cork oak trees, Domaine Mas Cristine is the oldest wine estate in the region. Established in 1810, the estate boasts magnificent old vines rooted in one of the finest terroirs of Roussillon, at the southern edge of the AOC Côtes du Roussillon appellation.

The vineyards are planted with Syrah, Grenache, Roussanne, Marsanne, and Muscat, producing wines that reflect the authentic character of the Mediterranean landscape. As an independent, organic winegrower, Domaine Mas Cristine is committed to quality and sustainability. Visitors are welcome to enjoy guided tours of the vineyard and cellar, as well as tastings that reveal the estate's rich winemaking heritage.

DOMAINE DU CHÂTEAU DE VALMY

The Domaine du Château Valmy, a wine estate since 1930, is renowned for its AOC Côtes du Roussillon, Muscat de Rivesaltes, and Rivesaltes wines.

Nestled in the heart of a park of century-old cedar trees, this Art Nouveau château, built between 1888 and 1900, is truly a unique and enchanting place.

More than just a winemaking estate, Château Valmy is a jewel of architecture offering the most breathtaking panorama over Argelès-sur-Mer and its surroundings. From its terraces, visitors can gaze out over the sea, the Pyrenees, the Roussillon plain, and the surrounding vineyards a romantic setting where nature, history, and wine come together in perfect harmony.

DOMAINE DEPRADE JORDA

Rooted for four generations in the winegrowing landscape of Argelès-sur-Mer, this family estate spans 90 hectares, stretching between the foothills of the Albères Mountains and the Taxo plain. Around fifteen grape varieties are cultivated here on a remarkable diversity of soils schist, gneiss, clay, limestone, sand, and silt creating an exceptional richness of terroirs.

Located in the heart of the village of Argelès-sur-Mer, the wine cellar welcomes visitors for an authentic immersion into the world of winemaking. Guided tours of the cellar and walks through the vineyards reveal the meticulous work carried out throughout the seasons, offering a deeper understanding of the soul and heritage of this historic vineyard.



MAISON ALBERA

Maison Albera crafts wines from the high-altitude terroirs of Roussillon, combining freshness and elegance while remaining deeply committed to environmental sustainability. Thanks to a wide range of grape varieties, each cuvée perfectly expresses the authenticity and diversity of this exceptional winegrowing region.

Visitors are warmly invited to discover these wines in a welcoming and refined tasting space, designed to offer a truly immersive sensory experience.

DOMAINE DE LA MER BLANCHE

Born from the collaboration between a dedicated farmer and an experienced mixologist, Domaine de la Mer Blanche has created a unique range of Cellos the result of fascinating experiments with flavours, aromas, and infusion techniques specific to these artisanal spirits.

On nearly one hectare, a variety of citrus trees coexist some local, others rare and exotic within an ecosystem designed to let them thrive naturally, producing juicy and aromatic fruits.

Practicing agroforestry to shield these wind-sensitive trees and using carefully managed irrigation to prepare them for drought, this productive orchard, planted in 2016, now allows Frédéric Bey to offer exceptional creations that rediscover the pure taste of lemon, orange, mandarin, pomelo, yuzu, finger lime, and kumquat.



DOMAINE DU MAS BOUTET

At Domaine du Mas Boutet, the olive tree is a family story that began in 1940. Today, the estate spans 12 hectares, home to both ancient olive trees that survived the great frost of 1956 and newer plantations that continue the legacy. Here, traditional varieties such as Olivière, Picholine, Picual, Argudell, and Rudunell thrive under the Mediterranean sun.

A wide range of olive-based products complements the estate's selection of olive oils including jams, olive spreads, table olives, and other Mediterranean delicacies. While olive cultivation remains the heart of Mas Boutet's activity, the estate also grows citrus fruits, fig trees, thyme, rosemary, and other regional herbs used to create flavourful homemade preserves.



FINOTE

Finote is the meeting point between a singular family story and a boldly contemporary vision. It all began in the 19th century in Argelès-sur-Mer. Finote, the great-grandmother of Élodie Swanberg, crafted audacious aperitifs made from mountain herbs and spices, capturing the soul and flavours of the Catalan land. More than a century later, Élodie Swanberg draws inspiration from this heritage to create modern, elegant and deeply authentic non-alcoholic beverages. Finely reworked recipes designed to surprise today's palates.

Finote also reimagines iconic aperitif and cocktail classics, infusing them with a natural, contemporary twist. Spritz, Espresso Martini and Negroni are reinvented as alcohol-free creations, remaining true to their original spirit while offering a refined and accessible tasting experience for all. Finote introduces a new way to enjoy the aperitif: refined, natural and uncompromising. A contemporary alternative that blends pleasure, character and respect for tradition.

LA PETITE ARGELÉSIENNE

Founded by Sarah Essaadani, draws its inspiration from Argelès-sur-Mer and the vibrant energy of a youthful, life-loving spirit. The brand offers clean cosmetics, a clothing collection, accessories and home décor items. Both a creative studio and a concept store, La Petite Argelésienne blends handcrafted creations made by the founder with co-creations developed alongside local artisans. Certified Made in Occitanie, the brand highlights regional know-how through local production, short supply chains and frequently upcycled materials. A sunny, authentic and responsible universe, deeply rooted in the Argelès way of life.



LE COUTEAU CATALAN

Philippe Bottaioli, master craftsman and artisan, creates custom-made Catalan knives in his workshop in Argelès-sur-Mer. Once a symbol of danger in the hands of 19th-century highwaymen the infamous trabucayres the Catalan knife has since become a beloved everyday companion. Its distinctive design a willow leaf-shaped blade and a curved handle makes it truly unique, earning it a place among France's most renowned regional knives.

Drawing inspiration from the traditional model, Le Trabucayre, Philippe Bottaioli designed and crafted an innovative version featuring a built-in snail pick in the handle: "El Cargol". This creation, both functional and artistic, is patented with the INPI and embodies the beauty and utility of Catalan craftsmanship. Each piece is handmade, unique, and guaranteed for life, reflecting the art of living in the Catalan region authentic, proud, and timeless.



ARGILARIIS

Created by Barbara, a passionate artisan, Argilariis offers natural skincare products handcrafted using traditional methods. In her workshop-boutique at the foot of the Albères mountains, she designs cold-process solid soaps, nourishing liquid soaps, gentle shampoos and 100% natural body care products. Organic vegetable oils, French clays and pure essential oils: every ingredient is carefully selected to create products that respect both the skin and the environment. Free from synthetic fragrances and artificial colourings, each creation reflects a committed craftsmanship focused on simplicity, softness... and what truly matters.

Each solid soap is named after residents of villages in the region, paying tribute to the landscapes, scents and authenticity of the Catalan land.



JESSICA ROMALDI

A designer of unique accessories and jewellery made from recycled bicycle inner tubes. Eco-friendly and handcrafted, these pieces embody a sustainable and conscious approach to fashion.

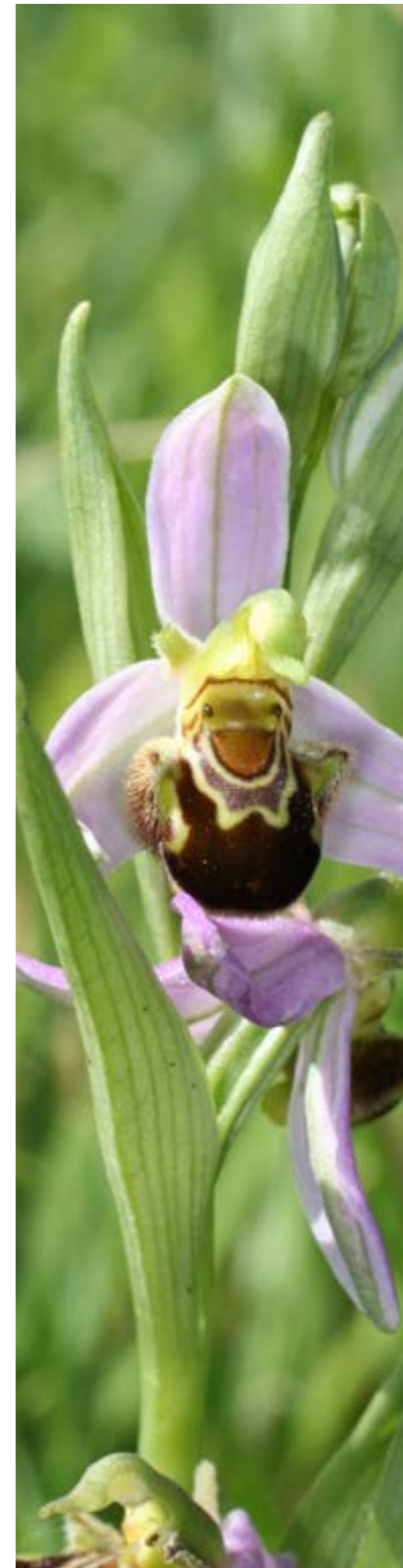
Soft, lightweight and waterproof, the inner tube is transformed cut, perforated and hand-painted into something truly precious. Each piece of jewellery reveals the hidden beauty of a discarded object and bears the distinctive mark of artisanal craftsmanship.

HEADING TOWARD *Sustainable Tourism*

Argelès-sur-Mer is a responsible destination that offers an unforgettable experience. Between accessible beaches, protected trails, and thriving biodiversity, the town embodies a sustainable vision of tourism.

Argelès-sur-Mer continually strives to make its territory more pleasant, inclusive, and environmentally respectful, for residents and visitors alike. This commitment earned it the “Territoire Engagé pour la Nature” label, awarded by the French Office for Biodiversity. Among its most notable initiatives is the removal of beach showers (since 2019) a strong measure to preserve water resources. The town also practices eco-friendly beach cleaning, focusing on targeted areas and using gentle methods that respect marine life and nesting zones, while maintaining welcoming, pristine beaches.

“Storm bins” have been installed to collect marine debris washed ashore. Additionally, jet skis are banned in certain areas to reduce noise pollution and protect the tranquility of the marine ecosystem, allowing both nature and visitors to flourish in harmony.



Green Destinations Label

A COMMITTED DESTINATION

The Albères Côte Vermeille Illibéris Community of Municipalities, which includes Argelès-sur-Mer, has been awarded the international Green Destinations label – Bronze level.

This distinction highlights the territory’s strong commitment to sustainable, resilient, and inclusive tourism.

While achieving the Bronze level represents an important milestone, it also opens the door to new opportunities for progress, reinforcing Argelès-sur-Mer’s determination to continue its efforts toward an ever more responsible and exemplary form of tourism.

Commitment to the Environment

A DRIVING FORCE FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

The town of Argelès-sur-Mer places environmental protection at the heart of its mission, with an ambitious policy dedicated to sustainable development.

An ecological transition department, supported by a team of protected natural area managers, works daily to preserve the richness and diversity of the local environment.

With two nature reserves serving as true refuges for biodiversity, the town is deeply committed to the conservation of its ecosystems. This commitment also takes shape through environmental education programs, designed to raise awareness among both children and adults about today’s ecological challenges.

Furthermore, Argelès-sur-Mer promotes an inspiring blend of ecology and art through the URB’ART Festival, whose creative direction highlights environmental issues via urban artistic expression.

Through these tangible initiatives, the town affirms its determination to combine quality of life, nature preservation, and environmental awareness for future generations.

Natura 2000

WHERE THE TECH AND MASSANE RIVERS MEET THE SEA

The Natura 2000 site “Embouchure du Tech et Grau de la Massane” covers a total area of 948 hectares, 70% of which lies offshore. Its terrestrial section spans 275 hectares and is located mainly in Argelès-sur-Mer, on land owned by the municipality, the Coastal Conservatory and the French Maritime Public Domain.

As part of the European Natura 2000 network, which protects nearly 13% of France’s territory, the site aims to preserve biodiversity by maintaining or restoring its natural habitats. Management is based on voluntary actions carried out in cooperation with landowners and users, within the framework of a management plan.

From Le Racou to Mas Larrieu, the terrestrial site extends across four natural units and marginally includes the municipality of Elne.

SETTING COURSE FOR *accessible tourism*



A city accessible to all AN EVERYDAY COMMITMENT

Argelès-sur-Mer reaffirms its strong commitment to accessibility and inclusion by continually developing adapted infrastructure and innovative solutions designed to facilitate access for all to the resort's beaches, leisure areas, tourist activities and accommodation.

A pioneer in the implementation of accessibility initiatives, Argelès-sur-Mer has held the national Handiplage label since 2004, a distinction that recognises the quality of its facilities, the safety of its installations and the expertise of the teams dedicated to supporting visitors. Each season, the destination continues to strengthen its efforts to offer an inclusive tourism experience, where comfort, safety and individual autonomy remain absolute priorities.

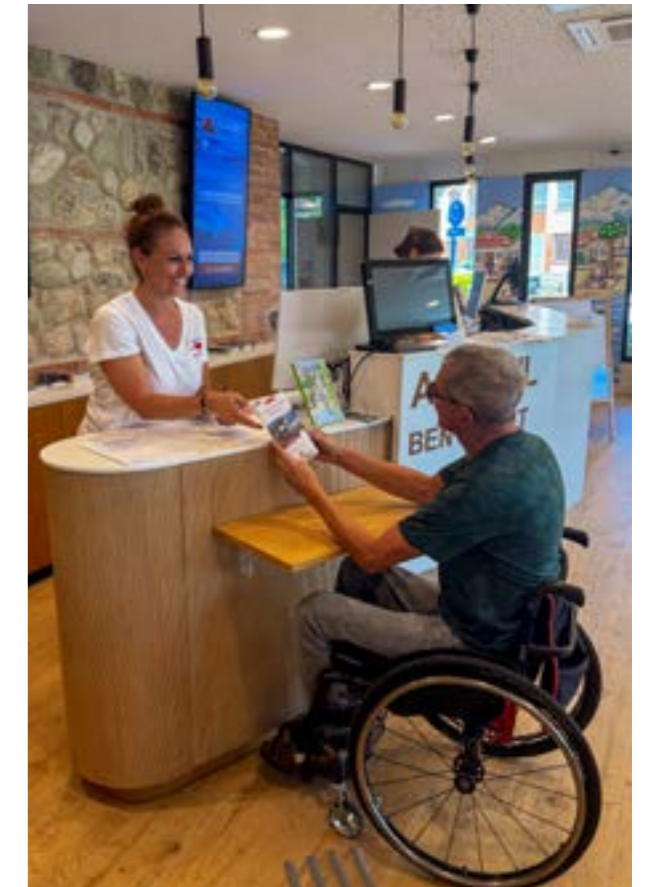


Accessible beaches ACTIONS THAT MAKE A DIFFERENCE

In Argelès-sur-Mer, access to the sea for all is becoming a tangible reality. As part of its quality and inclusion strategy, the beaches and all six lifeguard stations along the Argelès coastline are accessible to people with reduced mobility. At Plage des Pins, lifeguard station no. 3, which is particularly well equipped, has been awarded Level 3 of the Handiplage label. Facilities include a dedicated PRM parking area with four spaces, an accessible pathway as close as possible to the water with assistance, adapted toilets, five Tiralo beach wheelchairs, as well as a reserved and shaded area.

A committed tourist office FOR AN ACCESSIBLE WELCOME FOR ALL

The Argelès-sur-Mer Tourist Office is strengthening its commitment to accessibility by implementing a range of facilities designed to improve the welcome of visitors with disabilities. In the immediate vicinity of the Tourist Office, two dedicated PRM parking spaces provide direct and safe access to the building. A tactile guiding path leads visitors from the public roadway to the entrance and continues inside, ensuring smooth and independent circulation for visually impaired visitors. For visitors with hearing impairments, the reception desk is equipped with an induction loop, significantly improving sound quality during interactions with the advisors. The Tourist Office also provides adapted documentation, including large-print materials and the use of pictograms, to facilitate access to tourist information. Through these measures, the Tourist Office reaffirms its commitment to offering an inclusive and accessible welcome to all visitors.



Mainade Square A PLAYGROUND OPEN TO ALL

Developed on the site of the former pine grove at the Pujol roundabout, Mainade Square, inaugurated in June 2024, now offers a fully accessible playground designed to welcome all children, including those with disabilities. This landscaped park provides a family-friendly setting where everyone can enjoy adapted facilities.

The square is notably equipped with an accessible swing, allowing children with reduced mobility to fully take part in outdoor activities. This swing was donated to the town by the ADAFH association for people with multiple disabilities. This facility is part of the municipality's inclusion policy and reflects its commitment to offering a living environment open to all.

For tourism professionals, these facilities represent a real opportunity: to enhance a more inclusive offer and to promote a destination committed to accessibility among families and groups welcoming people with reduced mobility.

CULTURAL events

In 2026, the town of Argelès-sur-Mer invites visitors to enjoy a diverse and vibrant cultural program, celebrating local culture, history, and traditions. Throughout the year, exhibitions, festivals, and commemorative events will follow one another, offering both residents and visitors unique opportunities to discover art, heritage, and the rich identity of the region.

Sant Jordi CELEBRATING CATALONIA

Date : 23th of April

Sant Jordi or Saint George in English is the patron saint of Catalonia, celebrated every year on April 23rd since the 15th century. During this festival, men traditionally offer a red rose to their beloved, a gesture inspired by the legend of Sant Jordi. According to the tale, Sant Jordi, a noble knight, fought a fierce battle against a dragon that was terrorizing the village.

When he struck down the beast, red roses sprang from its blood, symbolizing love and courage. Since the 1920s, women have in turn offered a book to their loved one, making Sant Jordi a celebration of both love and culture. In Argelès-sur-Mer, the streets come alive with red roses and festive cheer, inviting couples, families, and friends.

Urb'Art THE CITY AS A CANVAS FOR EXPRESSION

The Urb'Art Festival is making a major comeback this year with an edition set to transform Argelès-sur-Mer into a true open-air museum. The programme includes live monumental murals, hip-hop dance performances, parkour demonstrations, concerts, DJ sets and participatory workshops offering hands-on introductions to various disciplines.

Covering 170 km with a positive elevation gain of 7,650 m, this demanding race connects the Mediterranean Sea to the Pyrenean mountains, revealing breathtaking panoramas along the way. The race will start in Bolquère, in the heart of the Pyrénées Catalanes Regional Natural Park, and finish in Argelès-sur-Mer at the Château de Valmy. Runners traverse a stunning variety of landscapes from coastal paths to dense forests and mountain ridges testing both their endurance and determination. Renowned for its challenging terrain and spectacular scenery, the 100 Miles Sud de France attracts every year a mix of elite athletes and passionate adventurers eager to push their limits in an extraordinary natural setting.
